Subject: Proposed Over-the-Rhine Residential Permit Parking Program (RPPP)

Dear Mr. Fortinberry:

The members of The Over-the-Rhine Community Council (OTRCC) have continued discussing the proposal that you presented to our parking and transportation committee on May 17. This letter, therefore, supersedes our June 12 letter to you on this subject. While the letter was approved by our board of trustees on July 9, it will be submitted for approval to our membership on July 23.

The Over-the-Rhine Community Council invites you to present the proposed RPP Program to our members on Monday, July 23. Please confirm your attendance at your earliest convenience.

The following is a list of our members' concern and issues with the proposed RPPP:

1. Number of Residential Permits per RPP Program or Area
No cap should be imposed on the RPP Area. However, each housing unit should be capped at two residential permits. Residency requires a valid driver license or vehicle registration and a utility bill or signed lease with the same address.
2. Permit Fee
The fee for each residential-parking permit should be \$30 per annum or \$15 semi-annum. We feel strongly that the cost should be the same for all permit holders and the cost should not be greater than the city charges in its existing RPP districts.
3. Hours of Enforcement
Twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, all year (24/7/365).

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4. Visitor Passes
Consistent with other RPPP areas, residents of each housing unit should be entitled to purchase temporary visitor passes for \$5 as needed.
5. Painted Parking Spaces
To create the discrete spaces designated Flexible Meter-and-RPP, a sideways T painted on the road bed near the line dividing the parking- and moving lanes would be deemed appropriate.
6. Adding more Parking Meters
Until an RPP Program is approved, no additional meters should be installed in Over-the-Rhine.
7. Community Engagement
The city should act now to start making arrangements for meaningful community forums to which all residents will be invited. Members of the Over-the-Rhine Community Council, along with a number of other community-based groups, will help the city undertake meaningful engagement.
8. The matter of Flexible Meter-and-RPP Spaces
For clarity and shared understanding, this component requires more discussion.

We believe each recommendation is reasonable and prudent, and we hope to continue to work closely with you and your colleagues.

As we go forward, the members of the Parking and Transportation Committee are available to meet with you again to discuss any of these recommendations or any other Over-the-Rhine parking issues that you may wish to discuss.
